Aldermaston 14th - 15th February

When CCND was asked to take part in the Trident Ploughshares event, we wanted to organise action that was supportive of our own members and others who were taking part in the blockade itself and also provided an alternative witness for others who, for whatever reason, did not want to risk arrest.

In October 2008, we held an all-night candlelit vigil, which as well as being meaningful for the participants, had an impact on the media, so it was decided to do this again, but October is October and February is February and as the day approached we felt anxious about the weather and the well-being of the vigillers. The temperature rose however, the air was too still to blow our candles out and a hardy core of 8, augmented by others at the beginning and the end, was able to keep a presence through the night. The liturgy was based on Morning and Night Prayer from Iona together with an hourly repetition of the Prayer for Peace. Simon Cottrell, the Bishop of Reading, took part in our 7.00am prayer.

At 11.00am the main interfaith liturgy took place. Chris Wood had put together readings and periods of silence. Among the readers were the RC Bishop of Brentwood, Thomas McMahon, Chris Elliot for the Methodists, and representatives of the Hindu and Buddhist Faiths. The peaceful atmosphere infected the very large number of police who declined to arrest any of the Faith Gate blockaders. Perhaps they felt the ensuing headlines would not be sympathetic.

The blockade successfully stopped all entry to the base for around half an hour (by police estimate). As one gate was cleared of blockaders, another gate was blocked. People came from all across the UK, and other European countries including Spain and Norway. 26 People were arrested but none from the Faith Gate.

The Queen's Foundation for Ecumenical Theological Education said:

"They call this place AWE but we are not in awe of you. You have occupied these 750 acres but they are not yours; the Earth is the Lord's! ... What right has this government got to spend no less than 20 billion pounds ... on a dangerous prestige symbol at a time when cuts are going to be made in health and education?"

Round the World for Peace

This year we travelled a bit further round the world than previously, visiting 16 embassies as part of the preparation for the NPT Review Conference in May. We wanted to hear what stance the national delegations would take, what were their hopes, and what effect they thought the cancellation of the British Trident programme would have on future disarmament negotiations.

We wrote to the 5 nuclear weapons states, the 3 'undeclared' NWS (Israel, India and Pakistan) and the 6 countries which form the New Agenda Coalition (countries which act together to persuade the NWS to do something about disarmament). This year we added Iran (because of its ambiguous position) and Japan (because of its history). North Korea is too far out of central London to visit on the walk day, but we did write with our questions. As a result, we were invited into 11 embassies to discuss our concerns and hopes. The walk had been divided into 3 groups and after a welcome from Rev. Richard Carter from St Martins and a short service in the Dick Sheppard Chapel, we set off into the Spring sunshine. At the end of the afternoon, most of the walkers or tube travellers were able to meet up and exchange notes in the St Martin's crypt café.

Here are some points made by various embassy representatives:

Ireland: to get as much positive commitment as possible to existing agreements, i.e. the 13 steps from 2000 and pressing hard for a nuclear free zone in the Middle East.

Iran would be pressing its right to peaceful development of nuclear power. (An unexpected result of this contact was an invitation to an expenses-paid visit to a conference on nuclear issues in Teheran, but for various reasons we felt unable to accept!)

Japan emphasised free and open inspection of nuclear facilities as a major way to make the Treaty work and increase trust.

Sweden was hopeful for substantial movement, thought our FCO was progressive and there was still an

opening for Trident cancellation but it would only be one bargaining chip.

Russia on the other hand said this move would be very important and would change the whole political atmosphere.

China underlined its own No First Use policy and said it would make unremitting efforts to promote the nuclear disarmament process. Even if there was only 1% success at the Review Conference, China would carry on working for peace. We should visit China and not base our ideas on the media!

Caroline Gilbert and Claire Poyner were part of an Abolition 2000 UK meeting at the FCO the following day. We met three junior members and heard the usual government line.

Our grateful thanks to all who came along and especially to those who took notes and sent in reports.

Sign the Rethink Trident statement

CND and Compass have brought together a coalition of over 100 leading figures from across British public



life to call for next week's Pre Budget Report to halt Trident replacement and re-deploy the resources saved to more socially useful areas.

EDM 380 Trident Replacement: "That this House notes that the UK is facing its biggest economic crisis since the Second World War and can ill afford to spend in excess of £76 billion on replacing the Trident nuclear weapons system; further notes that the UK's security needs are not met by nuclear weapons which do nothing to combat the threats posed by terrorism or climate change; further notes that while countries such as the UK justify their retention and replacement of nuclear weapons on the grounds of an uncertain future, the more likely it is that non-nuclear states will use the same rationale to justify developing their own weapons systems; and calls on the Government to cancel the replacement of Trident, to re-orientate the skilled manufacturing base towards the needs of a post-carbon future, making significant investment in green jobs and reallocating funds towards socially useful spending."

EDM 144 Negotiating A Nuclear Weapons

Convention: "That this House notes the forthcoming nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty (NPT) Review Conference in May 2010 and the opportunities it presents for progress on nuclear disarmament and non-proliferation; endorses the unanimous opinion of the International Court of Justice that there exists an obligation to pursue in good faith, and bring to a conclu-

sion, negotiations leading to nuclear disarmament in all its aspects under strict and effective international control; further notes growing international support for negotiation of a Nuclear Weapons Convention to outlaw all nuclear weapons; and calls on the Government to give full support to negotiating a Nuclear Weapons Convention and to make this position absolutely clear at the NPT Review Conference."

Flame of Hope

Spring is sprung! Now does a walk along the South Coast seem more attractive?

We have planned and pre-walked the part of the route from Lydd to Hastings, discovered that there is a bus from Hastings to Lydd on Sunday mornings in time to join the walk, contacted churches, press, civic dignitaries and provided a car and driver to give lifts when necessary. All we need now is FEET!

The planned timetable is printed below and there is possible accommodation with the Hastings Stop the War group.

- 8.45am** Meet LYDD Parish Church for short ceremony and prayers.
- 9.00am** Start walk towards Camber. Bus from Hastings arrives at Lydd Camp at 9.10am. Other walkers could join here.
4 ½ miles cycle/footpath adjacent to Jury's Gap Rd.
- 10.45am** Arrive at JURY'S GAP. Dungeness Nuclear Power Plant and Camber Wind Farm both visible from path on top of shingle bank. Car-parking in lay-by.
- 11.00am** Re-commence walk to Camber.
1 ½ miles along embankment or road to Camber, Sea Road.
- 11.30am** Arrive at CAMBER. Bus arrives at 11.03am
- 11.40am** Leave towards Rye.
2 ¾ miles cycle/footpath to New Road bridge.
- 12.45** Arrive in RYE, stopping place St Mary's Church. Lunch. Bus arrives station at 12.47pm
- 1.15pm** Leave Rye for Winchelsea.
3 miles via 1066 Country Walk to St Thomas's Church, Winchelsea.
- 2.15pm** Arrive WINCHELSEA, "Wesley Tree" outside church.
- 2.30pm** Leave for Cliff End.
2 ½ miles Royal Military Canal Path to Cliff End.
- 3.30pm** Arrive CLIFF END.
- 3.40pm** Leave Cliff End for Fairlight Visitor's Centre.
2 ½ miles via Saxon Shore Way.
- 4.40pm** Arrive FAIRLIGHT.
- 4.50pm** Leave Fairlight for Hastings Old Town.
2 ¾ miles via Hastings Country Park, Barley Lane.
- 6.00pm** Arrive HASTINGS OLD TOWN. To be met by Hastings group for a party!

Japanese bishops call for nuclear arms ban

Bishops from Hiroshima and Nagasaki have called on world leaders to work toward the total abolition of nuclear weapons. In an open letter to President Obama and the Japanese government, they said it was time to take the 'courageous step' and to 'make utmost efforts to abolish nuclear weapons'. The bishops urged world leaders to reach an agreement on reducing nuclear weapons at the NPT Review Conference in May.

School visits

CCND schools team have done presentations on War and Peace in three schools this year. Bishop Ramsey in Ruislip, St Olave's in Orpington, and La Sainte Union in Hampstead have all requested our presence to help with their syllabuses on the war and peace section of their RE revision.

This has been an enjoyable experience, hopefully to the pupils and teachers as well as the CCND team.

We have found that many young people are not aware that nuclear weapons still exist; they find the extract from Barefoot Gen harrowing and want to know what they can do about it.

At the sixth form conference at St Olave's, Kate Hudson from CND agreed to be a member of the panel for the 'question time' session. Even Kate, with all her experience, was shocked at the attitude of some of the boys at this school, some of whom advocated the indiscriminate use of nuclear weapons in the Middle East especially.

At another school, a student was heard to state: "what do nuclear weapons have to do with RE?"

We hope that our arguments made them think again!

Ilse Bell 22/2/1924 - 31/1/2010

CCND member Ilse Bell passed away peacefully on 31 January. Ilse grew up in Breslau, Germany, which is now Wroclaw in Poland. She came to England as a Kindertransportee in 1938, when child protection meant putting your child on a train and praying for their survival, when your own was unlikely. Ilse's parents perished in the holocaust.

Ilse led a very active life until age and frailty got the better of her. Among other things, Ilse was a teacher, active in CND and CCND, Mothers for Peace, Christian Aid, her own family and Search for Meaning, adventures in religion. Above all, Ilse will be remembered for the loving and generous spirit she showed everyone.

Ironically, in the same week we received news of Ilse's passing, we also received a letter from someone, professing to be a Christian, telling us why we must vote for the party which reflects Christian values. Indeed. Where we differ from the writer of this letter is in the party he recommends. Yes, you guessed, the writer is campaigning for the British National Party. The party whose leader has in the past denied the Holocaust (and no doubt still feels the same way in private). We don't need to go on, surely? Above all, please, dear friends, remember to use your democratic right and vote, just in case we get a government which decides we don't need, or shouldn't have, that right at all.



Rev. Alfred Willetts - 30th May 1915 - 13th February 2010. An appreciation

Back in Chester in the early 1980s, I first came across Alfred. Even in a city that had a large store of notable sights, Alf was eye-catching in his peace badge adorned stole and his fluorescent socks. When the official Town-Crier stepped down from the



Chester Cross, Alf stepped up to do his 'shout'. People hung over the balustrades of the Rows to get a better look and to hear about the evils of war and nuclear weapons. No heckler could get the better of him; he dealt with them with the humour that often led to comparisons with his friend Donald Soper. The last great peace witness he undertook was a pilgrimage to preach his message of peace outside each of the 44 cathedrals of the Church of England.

Alf's previous work as a vicar in Manchester together with his beloved wife, Phoebe, aroused his passion for the poor and disadvantaged. He railed against all forms of injustice, including the injustice he saw in his own church in denying ordination to women. The invitation he offered to an ordained woman-priest from the US to celebrate Communion in his parish created a furore.

No-one dared wear black at Alfred's funeral in Stevenage on 4th March - it was joyous as he had been. It was an honour to be there to say 'Goodbye' to my inspiration and my friend. (Photo above from the Chester Chronicle.)


